## IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

Mr. Marcantonio introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Insular Affairs and ordered to be printed

## A BILL

To provide for the granting of sovereignty to the island of Puerto Rico, and to provide for neighborly relations with the proposed Government of Puerto Rico.

- i Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 That ninety days after the enactment of this Act the Presi-
- 4 dent of the United States shall by proclamation withdraw
- 5 and surrender all rights of possession, supervision, jurisdic:
- 6 tion, control, and sovereignty now existing and exercised by
- 7 the United States in and over the Territory and people of
- 8 Puerto Rico, including all military, naval, and other reserva-
- 9 tions, and, on behalf of the United States, shall recognize the
- 10 independence of Puerto Rico as a separate and self-governing

nation and acknowledge the authority and control over the 1 same of any government which the people thereof may 2 constitute and the right of the Government of Puerto Rico :; to decide all internal questions, including those relating to 1 American property and citizens and diplomatic relations, õ without interference or intervention. 6 SEC. 2. All problems arising between the United ī States and Puerto Rico from the formation of the sovereign 7 Puerto Rican Government shall be submitted for arbitration 9 to a joint commission appointed by the Government of the 10 United States and the Government of Puerto Rico. 11 SEC. 3. In proclaiming the independence of Puerto 12 Rico, the President of the United States shall recognize the 1:; responsibility of the United States toward the present 11 disastrous state of Puerto Rican economy and the poverty 15 16 of its people and to strive for friendly relations with the new Government of Puerto Rico, shall declare free entry 17 on Puerto Rican products into the United States, and ne 15 immigration restrictions on Puerto Rican citizens shall be 19 made until the Government of Puerto Rico should expres-20 its desire otherwise. This principle is to be recognized in 21 a treaty between the two nations and said treaty shall be 22 made with the last intentions of developing Puerto Ricas 23 economy and the well-being of its people. The discussion 24 of this treaty shall begin within ninety days after the new 25

- 1 Government of Puerto Rico expresses its desire to begin.
- 2 In the interim between the proclamation of Puerto Rican
- 3 independence and the signing of this treaty, the present
- 4 status quo in the matter of trade relations shall be
- 5 maintained.
- 6 SEC. 4. By virtue of its responsibility for the present
- 7 disastrous state of Puerto Rican economy and the poverty
- s of the people of Puerto Rico, it is hereby declared to be the
- 9 policy of the United States that the United States shall be
- 10 responsible to the Puerto Rican people for any claims of
- 11 indemnity which the Government of Puerto Rico may make.
- 12 SEC. 5. Upon the proclamation and recognition of the
- iii independence of Puerto Rico, the President of the United
- 14 States shall give notice of such action to the governments
- 15 with which the United States is in diplomatic correspond-
- 16 ence and invite said governments to recognize the independ-
- 17 ence of Puerto Rico.
- 18 Sec. 6. At the time of the issuance of the proclamation
- 19 under section 1 hereof, the President shall appoint a com-
- 20 mission of five to carry out the provisions of section 2 and
- 21 section 4 of this Act.

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
