Mr. GILBERT introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs

A BILL

To establish a procedure for the prompt settlement, in a democratic manner, of the political status of Puerto Rico.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa- $\mathbf{2}$ tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, 3 That duly recognizing the inherent right and juridical capac-4 ity of the people of Puerto Rico to govern themselves and 5 to establish such relationships with the Government of the 6 United States as are freely agreed upon, the Congress takes 7 note of joint resolution numbered 1 of the Legislative Assem-8 bly of Puerto Rico, approved December 3, 1962, which 9 proposes to the Congress the prompt settlement, in a demo-10 cratic manner, of the political status of Puertc Rico and

hereby establishes the United States-Puerto Rico Compact
 Commission.

SEC. 2. The Commission shall be composed of twelve members of whom the President of the United States and the Governor of Puerto Rico shall each appoint four and the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of the Congress shall each appoint two.

8 The Commission shall draft a proposed compact of per-9 manent union between the Government of the United States 10 and the people of Puerto Rico in the light of the principles 11 expressed by the Legislative Assembly of Puerto Rico in said 12joint resolution numbered 1, namely: (a) "the recognition 13 and reassertion of the sovereignty of the people of Puerto 14 Rico"; (b) "the permanence and irrevocability of the union 15 between the United States and Puerto Rico on the basis of 16 common citizenship, common defense, common currency, free 17 market, common loyalty to the values of democracy, and of 18 such other conditions as may be considered, in the compact, 19 of mutual benent to the United States and Puerto Rico"; 20(c) the specific definition of the powers of the United States 21 with respect to Puerto Rico and the reservation of all other 22powers to the people of Puerto Rico; and (d) participation 23by the people of Puerto Rico in the powers exercised, under 24 the compact, by the Government of the United States, in 25matters affecting Puerto Rico, in a measure proportional to

the scope of such powers and the adoption of a formula under
 which the people of Puerto Rico will contribute, in a manner
 compatible with the stability and economic growth of Puerto
 Rico, to the general expenses of the United States Govern ment.

6 The Commission shall render its report to the President
7 and the Congress and to the Governor and the Legislative
8 Assembly of Puerto Rico.

9 SEC. 3. (a) Any member of the Commission who is not 10 an officer or employee of the Government of the United 11 States or the government of Puerto Rico shall be paid \$50 12 per day for his services while actually engaged on Commis-13 sion business, and all members shall be entitled to reimburse-14 ment for actual travel and reasonable subsistence expenses 15 incurred in connection with their service on the Commission.

16 (b) The Commission is authorized to appoint and fix the compensation of an Executive Secretary and such ad-17 18 ditional personnel as may be necessary to enable it to carry 19 out its functions without regard to the civil service laws and 20regulations, but any Federal employee subject to those laws who may be detailed to the Commission (which detail is 2122hereby authorized) shall retain his civil service status without interruption or loss of status or privilege. 23

(c) The Commission is authorized to call upon the headof any Federal department or agency to furnish, and the

heads of such departments and agencies are authorized to
 furnish without reimbursement, information and assistance
 which the Commission finds necessary for the performance of
 its functions.

SEC. 4. Costs incurred by the Commission shall be
shared equally by the United States and Puerto Rico. There
are hereby authorized to be appropriated such sums, but not
more than \$, as may be necessary to pay the United
States share of such costs.

SEC. 5. The President is hereby authorized to enter, on
behalf of the United States, into a compact with the people
of Puerto Rico upon fulfillment of the following conditions:

(a) Adoption of legislation by Congress, after the receipt of the report of the Commission, authorizing a new
compact.

16 (b) Ratification of such compact by the people of Puerto 17 Rico by a majority of the votes cast in a referendum to be 18 held for such purpose, pursuant to the laws of the Common-19 wealth of Puerto Rico, which laws shall also have provided 20for submission to the people, as alternatives to ratification 21 of the compact, of proposals to apply for statehood and for $\mathbf{22}$ independence: Provided, That if a majority of the voters 23participating in such referendum should favor either of such $\mathbf{24}$ two alternatives submitted to them instead of the Common-25wealth status as proposed to be amended, upon the result of

the referendum being certified by the Governor of Puerto
 Rico to the President, the President shall transmit such cer tification to the Congress of the United States for such action
 as it may consider appropriate.
