Mr. Ryan of New York introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs

A BILL

To establish a procedure for the prompt settlement, in a demoeratic manner, of the political status of Puerto Rico.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 That duly recognizing the inherent right and juridical capac-
- 4 ity of the people of Puerto Rico to govern themselves and
- 5 to establish such relationships with the Government of the
- 6 United States as are freely agreed upon, the Congress
- 7 takes note of Joint Resolution Numbered 1 of the Legislative
- 8 Assembly of Puerto Rico, approved December 3, 1962,
- 9 which proposes to the Congress the prompt settlement, in
- 10 a democratic manner, of the political status of Puerto Rico

1 and hereby establishes the United States-Pue >> Rico Com-

2 pact Commission.

3 SEC. 2. The Commission shall be composed of twelve

4 members of whom the President of the United States and

5 the Governor of Puerto Rico shall each appoint four and

6 the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House

7 of Representatives of the Congress shall each appoint two.

8 The Commission shall draft a proposed compact of

9 permanent union between the Government of the United

10 States and the people of Puerto Rico in the light of the

11 principles expressed by the Legislative Assembly of Puerto

12 Rico in said Joint Resolution Numbered 1, namely: (a)

13 "the recognition and reassertion of the sovereignty of the

14 people of Puerto Rico"; (b) "the permanence and irrev-

15 ocability of the union between the United States and Puerto

16 Rico on the basis of common citizenship, common defense,

17 common currency, free market, common loyalty to the values

18 of democracy, and of such other conditions as may be con-

19 sidered, in the compact, of mutual benefit to the United

20 States and Puerto Rico"; (c) the specific definition of the

21 powers of the United States with respect to Puerto Rico

22 and the reservation of all other powers to the people of

23 Puerto Rico; and (d) participation by the people of Puerto

24 Rico in the powers exercised, under the compact, by the

25 Government of the United States, in matters affecting Puerto

- 1 Rico, in a measure proportional to the scope of such powers
- 2 and the adoption of a formula under which the people of
- 3 Puerto Rico will contribute, in a manner compatible with
- 4 the stability and economic growth of Puerto Rico, to the
- 5 general expenses of the United States Government.
- 6 The Commission shall render its report to the President
- 7 and the Congress and to the Governor and the Legislative
- 8 Assembly of Puerto Rico.
- 9 Sec. 3. (a) Any member of the Commission who is
- 10 not an officer or employee of the Government of the United
- 11 States or the government of Puerto Rico shall be paid \$50
- 12 per day for his services while actually engaged on Commis-
- sion business, and all members shall be entitled to reim-
- 14 bursement for actual travel and reasonable subsistence ex-
- 15 penses incurred in connection with their service on the
- 16 Commission.
- (b) The Commission is authorized to appoint and fix
- 18 the compensation of an executive secretary and such addi-
- 19 tional personnel as may be necessary to enable it to carry
- 20 outs its functions without regard to the civil service laws
- 21 and regulations, but any Federal employee subject to those
- 22 laws who may be detailed to the Commission (which detail
- 23 is hereby authorized) shall retain his civil service status
- 24 without interruption or loss of status or privilege.
- 25 (c) The Commission is authorized to call upon the head

- 1 of any Federal department or agency to furnish, and the
- 2 heads of such departments and agencies are authorized to fur-
- 3 nish without reimbursement, information and assistance
- 4 which the Commission finds necessary for the performance of
- 5 its functions.
- 6 Sec. 4. Costs incurred by the Commission shall be shared
- 7 equally by the United States and Puerto Rico. There are
- 8 Tereby authorized to be appropriated such sums, but not more
- 9 than \$, as may be necessary to pay the United
- 10 States share of such costs.
- 11 Sec. 5. The President is hereby authorized to enter, on
- 12 behalf of the United States, into a compact with the people
- 13 of Puerto Rico upon fulfillment of the following conditions:
- 14 (a) Adoption of legislation by Congress, after the re-
- 15 ceipt of the report of the Commission, authorizing a new
- 16 compact.
- 17 (b) Ratification of such compact by the people of Puerto
- 18 Rico by a majority of the votes cast in a referendum to be
- 19 held for such purpose, pursuant to the laws of the Comman-
- 20 wealth of Puerto Rico, which laws shall also have provided
- 21 for submission to the people, as alternatives to ratification
- 22 of the compact, of proposals to apply for statehood and for
- 23 independence: Provided, That if a majority of the voters
- 24 participating in such referendum should favor either of such
- 25 two alternatives submitted to them instead of the Common-

- 1 wealth status as proposed to be amended, upon the result
- 2 of the referendum being certified by the Governor of Puerto
- 3 Rico to the President, the President shall transmit such cer-
- 4 tification to the Congress of the United States for such action
- 5 as it may consider appropriate.
