Mr. Powell introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs

## A BILL

To provide for the admission into the Union, on an equal footing with the original States, of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-1 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled. 2 That, subject to the provisions of this Act, and upon issuance 3 of the proclamation required by section 6 of this Act, the 4 Commonwealth of Puerto Rico is hereby declared to be a 5 State of the United States of America, admitted into the 6 Union on an equal footing with the other States in all re-7 spects whatever. The constitution drafted in accordance with 8 the Act entitled "An Act to provide for the organization of 9

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a constitutional government by the people of Puerto Rico", 1 adopted July 3, 1950, approved by the people of Puerto  $\mathbf{2}$ 3 Rico in a referendum held on March 3, 1952, and subsequently approved by the Congress on July 3, 1952, is 4 hereby found to provide a republican form of government, to  $\mathbf{5}$ be in conformity with the Constitution of the United States 6 7 and the principles of the Declaration of Independence, and is hereby accepted, ratified, and confirmed. 8

9 SEC. 2. Tax exemptions granted by the Commonwealth 10 of Puerto Rico to new industries in order to achieve the 11 necessary growth of the Commonwealth's economy for its 12general welfare shall be honored until the expiration date 13of such contractual obligations as contracts entered into 14 before the admission of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico into the Union. There is hereby authorized to be appro-15 16 priated from the taxes paid into the United States Treasury 17 as a result of the admission of the Commonwealth of Puerto 18 Rico into the Union such sums as may be equivalent to such 19 tax exemptions and necessary for performance of the obliga-20 tions inherent to them. Such sums shall be held as a sep-21 arate fund and paid into the Treasury of Puerto Rico.

SEC. 3. The State of Puerto Rico shall consist of all the
territory, together with the territorial waters appurtenant
thereto, now included in the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico.
SEC. 4. The government of the State of Puerto Rico

shall be republican in form, and the constitution of such 1 State shall not be repugnant to the Constitution of the United  $\mathbf{2}$ 3 States and the principles of the Declaration of Independence. SEC. 5. The State of Puerto Rico and its political sub-4 5 divisions, respectively, shall have and retain title to all prop-6 erty, real and personal, title to which is in the Common-7 wealth of Puerto Rico or any of its subdivisions. The United States shall retain title to all property, real and personal, to 8 9 which it has title, including public lands.

10 SEC. 6. Upon the enactment of this Act, the President 11 of the United States shall, not later than months 12 after the date of the enactment of this Act, notify the Gov-13 ernor of Puerto Rico of the enactment of this Act. There-14 upon the Governor shall, within days of such notifica-15tion, issue his proclamation for the elections, as hereinafter 16 provided, for officers of all elective offices. Such elections 17 shall be conducted in the manner provided for by the con-18 stitution of the proposed State of Puerto Rico. The officers 19 so elected shall in any event include two Senators and one 20Representative in Congress.

SEC. 7. (a) The proclamation of the Governor of Puerto
Rico required by section 6 shall provide for the holding of
a general election on dates to be fixed by the Governor of
Puerto Rico, except that the general election shall not be
held later than . At such elections the officers re-

quired to be elected as provided in section 6 shall be, and 1 officers for other elective offices provided for in the constitu- $\mathbf{2}$ tion of the proposed State of Puerto Rico may be, chosen by 3 the people. Such elections shall be held, and the qualifica-4 5 tions of voters in such elections shall be, as prescribed by the constitution of the proposed State of Puerto Rico for the elec-6 tion of members of the proposed State legislature. The 7 returns of the election shall be made and certified in such 8 9 manner as the constitution of the proposed State of Puerto 10 Rico may prescribe. The Governor of Puerto Rico shall 11 certify the results of said election to the President of the 12United States.

13 (b) (1) At an election designated by proclamation of the Governor of Puerto Rico, which may be the general 1415election held pursuant to subsection (a) of this section, a 16 Commonwealth general election, or a special election, there 17 shall be submitted to the electors qualified to vote in said 18 election, for adoption or rejection, the following proposition: 19 "Shall Puerto Rico immediately be admitted into 20the Union as a State?"

(2) In the event the foregoing proposition is adopted
at said election by a majority of the legal votes cast, the
constitution of the proposed State of Puerto Rico, ratified
by the people at the election held on March 3, 1952, shall
be deemed amended accordingly. In the event the foregoing

proposition is not adopted at said election by a majority of
 the legal votes cast, the provisions of this Act shall there upon cease to be effective.

(3) The Governor of Puerto Rico is hereby authorized 4 and directed to take such action as may be necessary or 5 appropriate to insure the submission of such proposition to 6 the people. The return of the votes cast on such proposition 7 shall be made by the election officers directly to the sec-8 retary of state of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, who 9 shall certify the results of the submission to the Governor. 10 The Governor shall certify the results of said submission. 11 as so ascertained, to the President of the United States. 12 13 (c) (1) If the President shall find that the proposition set forth in the preceding subsection has been duly adopted 14 by the people of Puerto Rico, the President, upon certifica-15 tion of the returns of the election of the officers required 16 to be elected as provided in section 6 of this Act, shall 17 thereupon issue his proclamation announcing the results of 18 said election as so ascertained. Upon the issuance of said 19

20 proclamation by the President, the Commonwealth of Puerto
21 Rico shall be deemed admitted into the Union as provided
22 in the first section of this Act.

(2) Until such Commonwealth is so admitted into theUnion, all of the officers of such Commonwealth, including

1 the Resident Commissioner in Congress from such Commonwealth, shall continue to discharge the duties of their respect- $\mathbf{2}$ 3 tive offices. Upon the issuance of such proclamation by the President of the United States and the admission of the 4 State of Puerto Rico into the Union, the officers elected at  $\mathbf{5}$ such elections, and qualified under the provisions of the 6 7 constitution and laws of such State, shall proceed to exercise 8 all the functions pertaining to their offices in or under or by 9 authority of the government of such State, and officers not 10 required to be elected at such initial election shall be selected 11 or continued in office as provided by the constitution and laws of such State. The Governor of such State shall certify 1213 the elections of the Senators and Representative in the 14 manner required by law, and such Senators and Representa-15 tive shall be entitled to be admitted to seats in Congress 16and to all the rights and privileges of Senators and Repre-17 sentatives of other States in the Congress of the United 18 States.

(d) (1) Upon admission of the State of Puerto Rico
into the Union as herein provided, all of the Commonwealth
laws then in force in the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico shall
be and continue in full force and effect throughout said
State except as modified or changed by this Act, by the constitution of the State, or by the legislature of the State. All
of the laws of the United States shall have the same force and

effect within the said State as elsewhere within the United
 States.

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(2) As used in paragraph (1) —

4 (A) the term "Commonwealth laws" includes (in 5 addition to laws enacted by the Legislature of the Com-6 monwealth of Puerto Rico) all laws or parts thereof en-7 acted by the Congress the validity of which is dependent 8 solely upon the authority of the Congress to provide for 9 the government of Puerto Rico prior to the admission of 10 the State of Puerto Rico into the Union, and

(B) the term "laws of the United States" includes
all laws or parts thereof enacted by the Congress that
(i) apply to or within Puerto Rico at the time of the
admission of the State of Puerto Rico into the Union,
(ii) are not "Commonwealth laws" as defined in subparagraph (A), and (iii) are not in conflict with any
other provisions of this Act.

18 SEC. 8. The State of Puerto Rico upon its admission into 19 the Union shall be entitled to one Representative until the 20 taking effect of the next reapportionment, and such Repre-21 sentative shall be in addition to the membership of the House  $\mathbf{22}$ of Representatives as now prescribed by law. Such tempo-23rary increase in the membership shall not operate either to  $\mathbf{24}$ increase or decrease the permanent membership of the House 25of Representatives as prescribed in the Act of August 8,

1911 (37 Stat. 13), nor shall such temporary increase affect
 the basis of apportionment established by the Act of Novem ber 15, 1941 (2 U.S.C. 2a), for the Eighty-third Congress
 and each Congress thereafter.

SEC. 9. The sum of \$100,000, or so much thereof as  $\mathbf{5}$ 6 may be necessary, is hereby authorized to be appropriated, 7 out of any money in the Treasury of the United States not otherwise appropriated, for defraying the expenses of the 8 9 elections provided for in this Act and of the convention, and 10 for the payment of the members and officers and employees 11 thereof under the same rules and regulations and at the same 12rates as are provided in the case of members of the Legisla-13 ture of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, and the disburse-14 ments of money appropriated by this section shall be made 15by the Treasurer of Puerto Rico.

SEC. 10. Effective upon the admission of the State of
 Puerto Rico into the Union—

(1) the State of Puerto Rico shall constitute a judicial district within the first judicial circuit, to be known
as the District of Puerto Rico;

(2) the United States District Court for the District of Puerto Rico established by and existing under
title 28 of the United States Code shall thenceforth be
a court of the United States with judicial power derived
from article III, section 1, of the Constitution of the

1 United States, except that the term of office of the dis- $\mathbf{2}$ trict judge for the District of Puerto Rico then in office 3 shall terminate upon the effective date of this section and 4 the President, pursuant to sections 133 and 134 of title 5 28, United States Code, as amended by this Act, shall 6 appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Sen-7 ate, a district judge for such district who shall hold office 8 during good behavior; and

9 (3) the first sentence of subsection (a) of section 10 134 of title 28, United States Code, is amended by 11 striking out "and, except in Puerto Rico," and the 12 second sentence of such subsection (a) is repealed. 13 SEC. 11. Effective upon the admission of the State of 14 Puerto Rico to the Union, the second paragraph of section 15 451 of title 28, United States Code, is amended by striking 16 out "the United States District for the District of Puerto 17 Rico,".

18 SEC. 12. (a) No writ, action, indictment, cause, or 19 proceeding pending in any court of the Commonwealth of 20Puerto Rico, or in the United States District Court for the 21 District of Puerto Rico, shall abate by reason of the admis-22sion of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico into the Union, 23but the same shall be transferred to, and proceeded with, 24 in such appropriate State courts as shall be established 25under the constitution to be thus formed, or shall continue

in the United States District Court for the District of Puerto 1 Rico, as the nature of the case may require. And no writ,  $\mathbf{2}$ action, indictment, cause, or proceeding shall abate by reason 3 of any change in the courts, but shall be proceeded with in 4 the State or United States courts according to the laws there- $\mathbf{5}$ of, respectively. The appropriate State courts shall be the 6 successors of the courts of the Commonwealth of Puerto 7 8 Rico as to all cases arising within the limits embraced within the jurisdiction of such courts, respectively, with full power 9 to proceed with the same, and award means or final process 1011 therein and all the files, records, indictments, and proceedings relating to any such writ, action, indictment, cause, or 1213 proceeding shall be transferred to such appropriate State 14 courts, and the same shall be proceeded with therein in due 15course of law.

16 (b) All civil causes of action and all criminal offenses 17 which shall have arisen or been committed prior to the 18 admission of such State, but as to which no writ, action, indictment, or proceeding shall be pending at the date of 19 20 such admission, shall be subject to prosecution in the appro-21 priate State courts or in the United States District Court 22for the District of Puerto Rico in like manner, to the same 23extent, and with like right of appellate review, as if said 24 State had been created and said State courts had been 25established prior to the accrual of such causes of action or

the commission of such offenses. The admission of such 1  $\mathbf{2}$ State shall effect no change in the substantive or criminal 3 law governing such causes of action and criminal offenses 4 which shall have arisen or been committed; and such of the  $\mathbf{5}$ criminal offenses as shall have been committed against the 6 laws of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico shall be tried 7 and punished by the appropriate courts of such State, and 8 such as shall have been committed against the laws of the 9 United States shall be tried and punished in the United 10 States District Court for the District of Puerto Rico.

11 SEC. 13. Parties shall have the same rights of appeal 12 from and appellate review of final decisions of the United 13 States District Court for the District of Puerto Rico or the 14 Supreme Court of Puerto Rico in any case finally decided 15 prior to admission of such State into the Union, whether or 16not an appeal therefrom shall have been perfected prior to 17 such admission, and the United States Court of Appeals 18 for the First Circuit and the Supreme Court of the United 19 States shall have the same jurisdiction therein, as by law 20 provided prior to admission of such State into the Union, 21 and any mandate issued subsequent to the admission of 22such State shall be to the United States District Court for 23the District of Puerto Rico or a court of the State, as may  $\mathbf{24}$ be appropriate. Parties shall have the same rights of appeal 25from and appellate reviews of all orders, judgments, and

decrees of the United States District Court for the District 1 2 of Puerto Rico, and of the State court which is the successor to the Supreme Court of Puerto Rico, in any case pending 3 at the time of admission of said State into the Union, and 4 the United States Court of Appeals for the First Circuit 5 and the Supreme Court of the United States shall have the 6 7 same jurisdiction therein, as by law provided in any case 8 arising subsequent to the admission of such State into the 9 Union.

SEC. 14. (a) Effective upon the admission of the State
of Puerto Rico into the Union—

(1) the first paragraph of section 373 of title 28,
United States Code, is amended by striking out "United
States District Court for the District of Puerto Rico,";

(2) the first paragraph of section 1252 of title 28,
United States Code, is amended by striking out "and any court of record of Puerto Rico";

(3) section 1258 of title 28 of the United States
Code is repealed, and the analysis of chapter 81 of such
title is amended by striking out

"1258. Supreme Court of Puerto Rico; appeal; certiorari."

(4) section 3771 of title 18 of the United States
Code is amended by striking out "in the Supreme Court
of Puerto Rico,"; and

24 (5) the first paragraph of section 3772 of title 18

of the United States Code is amended by striking out
 "in the Supreme Court of Puerto Rico,".

3 (b) The amendment made by paragraph (1) of sub4 section (a) of this section shall not affect the rights of any
5 judge or justice who may have retired before the effective
6 date of this section.

7 SEC. 15. All laws of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico in force therein at the time of its admission into the Union 8 9 shall continue in force in the State of Puerto Rico, except as 10 modified or changed by this Act or by the constitution of 11 the State, and shall be subject to repeal or amendment by 12the Legislature of the State of Puerto Rico. The laws of 13 the United States shall have the same force and effect within 14 such State as elsewhere within the United States.

15 SEC. 16. The first paragraph of section 2 of the Fed-16 eral Reserve Act, as amended (38 Stat. 252), is amended by 17 striking out the last two sentences thereof and inserting in 18 lieu thereof the following: "When any State is admitted to 19 the Union, the Federal Reserve districts shall be readjusted 20 by the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System in 21 such manner as to include such State. Every national bank 22in any State shall, upon commencing business or within 23ninety days after admission into the Union of the State in 24which it is located, become a member bank of the Federal 25 Reserve System by subscribing and paying for stock in the

Federal Reserve bank of its district in accordance with the
 provisions of this Act, and shall thereupon be an insured
 bank under the Federal Deposit Insurance Act, and failure
 to do so shall subject such bank to the penalty provided by
 the sixth paragraph of this section."

6 SEC. 17. (a) Nothing contained in this Act shall be 7 construed as depriving the Federal Maritime Board of the 8 exclusive jurisdiction heretofore conferred on it over com-9 mon carriers engaged in transportation by water between 10 any port in the State of Puerto Rico and other ports in the 11 United States, or possessions, or as conferring on the Inter-12state Commerce Commission jurisdiction over transportation 13 by water between any such ports.

(b) Effective on the admission of the State of Puerto
Rico into the Union—

(1) the first sentence of section 506 of the Merchant Marine Act, 1936 (46 U.S.C. 1156), is amended
by inserting immediately before ", or an island possession or island territory" the following: ", the State
of Puerto Rico";

(2) section 605 (a) of the Merchant Marine Act,
1936 (46 U.S.C. 1175), is amended by inserting immediately before ", or an island possession or island territory", the following: ", the State of Puerto Rico"; and
(3) the second paragraph of section 714 of the

Merchant Marine Act, 1936 (46 U.S.C. 1204), is
 amended by inserting immediately before ", or an island
 possession or island territory" the following: ", the
 State of Puerto Rico".

5 SEC. 18. (a) Section 101 (a) (36) of the Immigration 6 and Nationality Act (8 U.S.C. 1101 (a) (36)) is amended 7 by striking out "Puerto Rico,".

8 (b) Section 212 (d) (7) of the Immigration and Na9 tionality Act (8 U.S.C. 1182 (d) (7)) is amended by strik10 ing out in the first sentence "Puerto Rico,".

(c) The first sentence of section 310 (a) of the Immigration and Nationality Act (8 U.S.C. 1421 (a)) is
amended by striking out "and for Puerto Rico".

(d) Nothing contained in this Act shall be held to repeal, amend, or modify the provisions of section 302 of
the Immigration and Nationality Act (8 U.S.C. 1405).

17 SEC. 19. Nothing contained in this Act shall operate to 18 confer United States nationality, nor to terminate nationality 19 heretofore lawfully acquired, or restore nationality hereto-20 fore lost under any law of the United States or under any 21 treaty to which the United States is or was a party.


SEC. 20. If any provision of this Act, or any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or individual word, or the application thereof in any circumstance is held invalid the validity of the remainder of the Act and of the

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application of any such provision, section, subsection, sen tence, clause, phrase, or individual word in other circum stances shall not be affected thereby.

4 SEC. 21. All Acts or parts of Acts in conflict with the 5 provisions of this Act, whether passed by the Legislature of 6 Puerto Rico or by Congress, are hereby repealed.
